## C. DELEGATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS

### 1. **Shannon Woykin, Executive Director, Langley Meals on Wheels (LMOW)**

S. Woykin provided a presentation regarding the Langley Meals on Wheels and noted that they have been delivering meals since 1979. The following information was provided:

#### **Mission:**

Deliver services to the communities for all to be fed, connected and supported. Committed to promoting health, dignity and social connection through food and community support.

#### **Vision for the future:**

Community Centered Approach:

No barriers – proving programs and reaching all those in need - seniors, individuals recovering from hospitalization, families/individuals facing food insecurity.

- Meal Programs include hundreds of nutritious meals delivered weekly.
- Safety check – 5,000 checks between 2022 and 2024
- LMOW programs are volunteer driven – 26,144 volunteer hours last year

#### **Program Impact Highlights**

- Currently over 300 volunteers
- Annual Meals Served: 73,231
- Clients Served: 576
- Subsidized Clients: 286
- Meal Delivery Routes Driven: 3,450

#### **How the community is supported:**

- Home from the Hospital program – daily meal delivery supporting those who are transitioning from hospital to home - 1834 meals delivered this year.
- LMOW Firehouse Café – social enterprise community café – revenue supports meal program subsidies and increased awareness.
- Food and Friends – 55+ social luncheon.
- Community Cooking Classes – promotes food literacy and healthy meal preparation.
- Community Garden Beds – growing fresh produce, involving community in sustainable food practices.
- Meal Café Gift Card Program – Discreet program providing access to meals at the LMOW Firehouse Café. No cost program providing food security with dignity. Available through local schools and service providers.
- Starfish Summer Program
- Healthy Living Bags
- “Let’s Talk Food Table” Initiative – collaborative community effort addressing food security and resource-sharing in Aldergrove.

**C. DELEGATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS**

- Space for Community Groups – space rentals providing availability of services – from counselling to community meetings.

**Community Outreach:**

- Community Outreach Meal Program – 11,200 meals last year.
- Referrals to services: 210 year to date.
- Reaching members of the community who often only have contact with first responders.
